



VIEWS FROM THE WEBINAR AUDIENCE: REGISTRATION QUESTIONS

Are researchers advantaged/disadvantaged in research assessments because of their language skills and preferences?









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

BARCELONA DECLARATION ON OPEN RESEARCH INFORMATION
Commitment 1
We will make openness the default for the research information we use and produce



THE REFORM AGREEMENT AND COARA

- The Agreement on Reforming Research Assessment published in 2022 has **over 750 signatory organisations from over 50 countries** (Europe and beyond)
- The Agreement includes principles, **10 commitments and 5 year timeframe** for reforms with action plan
- Agreement does not have any legally binding effect but it **represents a public commitment** to contribute actively and constructively to reforming research assessment
- **CoARA (Coalition for Advancing Research Assessment) is a community of signatories** for advancing research assessment, for sharing and developing practices
- Coalition members are involved in **National Chapters** (currently 16) and **Working Groups** (currently 13) and other Coalition activities.

RESEARCH ASSESSMENT IN COARA



COARA CORE COMMITMENTS

1. Recognise the diversity of contributions to, and careers in, research in accordance with the needs and nature of the research
 - Scope: recognition of the broad diversity of valuable contributions that researchers make to science and for the benefit of society, including diverse outputs beyond journal publications and **irrespective of the language in which they are communicated**;
2. Base research assessment primarily on qualitative evaluation for which peer review is central, supported by responsible use of quantitative indicators
3. Abandon inappropriate uses in research assessment of journal- and publication-based metrics, in particular inappropriate uses of Journal Impact Factor (JIF) and h-index
 - Scope: 'Inappropriate uses' include... **assessing outputs based on metrics relating to** publication venue, format or **language**
4. Avoid the use of rankings of research organisations in research assessment



WG MISSION

- By addressing language diversity and biases in assessment, **WG supports the EU (and other) institutions in fulfilling their duty** to enhance, promote and uphold linguistic equity, diversity and non-discrimination in Europe and globally.
- This requires fostering an **academic culture** that values diverse competencies, interactions and communications in all languages without exclusions or priorities.



The United Nations' Universal Declaration of Human Rights article 27 states that **"everyone has the right freely to participate in the cultural life of the community, to enjoy the arts and to share in scientific advancement and its benefits"**, and this according to Article 2 **"without distinction of any kind, such as... language"**

The Charter of Fundamental Rights of the EU also places an obligation on the Union to **respect linguistic diversity** (Article 22) **and prohibits discrimination on grounds of language** (Article 21).

WG MAIN OBJECTIVES

1. to **raise awareness** across all fields about the importance of “multilingualism in practice of science, in scientific publications and in academic communications” (UNESCO)
2. to provide institutions with **policy advice, guidelines, and implementation proposals** for recognizing, rewarding and incentivizing research carried out and communicated in all languages, and for addressing language biases in metrics, expert-assessment and rankings





TF3: Policy advice and implementation


Our **Task Force 3 (TF3)** focuses on two **objectives**:

- the preparation of language elements and recommendations for policy makers at the level of EU institutions, international organisations, countries, and for research actors/stakeholders,
- the identification of relevant approaches, solutions, methods and models for addressing language biases in assessment and supporting language skills of non-fluent speakers in concrete situations.

By developing these two objectives, many questions arise which need concrete responses.


TF3: Policy advice and implementation

- Our TF3 is co-chaired by Monica (ISE), Emmanuelle (Coimbra Group) and Martine (ANR) and supported by a core group composed of Johan (cOAlitionS) and Fotis (OPERAS) (and Vidar (UHR), Gunar (NIFU))
- more than 30 CoARA experts expressed their interest and have been participating
- more and active experts needed
- Our aim is to jointly reflect and explore possible options taking an “ideal scenario” as reference.
- To reach that aim we need the support of a Focus Group of experienced people.




TF3 FOCUS GROUP

- We are looking for members of organisations who already started implementation of CoARA commitments to establish a Focus Group.
- It will work with us in testing our ideas and recommendations on practical solutions of implementation aiming to reduce or even avoid language bias.
- Our wish is to create a collaborative, mutual benefit, relation:
 - Support research stakeholders in fulfilling their commitment to enhance, promote and uphold linguistic equity, diversity and non-discrimination in Europe and beyond
 - Help the organisations of the Focus Group members in evaluating the state of play of their commitment to CoARA in general and multilingualism in particular
 - The Focus Group to help the TF3 to improve the formulation of its recommendations and implementation ideas with practical solutions.
- The main goal is to gather concrete experience and contribute to the development of policy advice, guidelines and good practices to be able to then help other organisation taking up the challenge.



TF3 FOCUS GROUP MEMBERS

- We target different stakeholders such as research funding bodies, research performing organisations, including universities, as well as national, European and international associations of researchers and scientists.
- We would like members of the Focus Group to:
 - share with us the challenges that their research organisation may face when supporting multilingualism in their research assessment procedures (including the researchers' perspective),
 - provide us with concrete feedback on the feasibility of our ideas and recommendations,
 - Suggest solutions to support the processes and activities (including how to use the best translation tools) and make progress in this area.
- To help decision taking we have prepared an invitation letter, an explanatory Annex and a short questionnaire.








POTENTIAL WG IMPACTS

- Provide equal opportunities to researchers and institutions irrespective of research orientation and mission, or language competencies




HOW TO CONTRIBUTE
