Marie Skłodowska - Curie (1867-1934)

- Founded in 2012, the MCAA grew to a dynamic network boasting more than 22 000 members. As of 2014, an AISBL based in Belgium.
- Membership is free and open to any past or present beneficiary of funding under any of the past or present schemes of the European Commission's MSCA programme (fellows, supervisors, project managers...).
- Funding and support for the MCAA is provided mainly by the European Commission Directorate General for Education and Culture, while increasingly diversifying funding sources.

The MCAA provides lifetime opportunities: continuous support of beneficiaries, regardless of career path, stage, location, or research field.

Survey Methodology



Survey Design:

- Descriptive, cross-sectional design;
- Mix of closed-ended and open-ended questions;
- Likert scales for views, satisfaction, and agreement;
- Open-ended questions for qualitative feedback.

Sampling:

- Target: Current and past MSCA fellows, particularly MCAA members.
- Over 22,000 members, with additional participants reached via social media.

Data Collection:

- 16-week period (15 March 5 July 2024).
- Online distribution via email and social media.
- Incentives offered (micro-grants, Coursera licenses).
- ~1,600 responses received, with ~1,200 valid responses
 (response rate: ~5.5%), ~320 responses for
 multilingualism .

Data Processing:

- Closed-ended questions numerically coded for statistical analysis.
- Open-ended responses categorized into themes.
- Data cleaning to remove inconsistencies, missing values, and duplicates.

Ethical Considerations:


- Voluntary participation and confidentiality ensured.
- Informed consent obtained via an online form.

Limitations:

- Response bias potential (more active fellows might have participated);
- Generalizability limited to reachable MSCA fellows and MCAA members.
- More responses from past fellows than current fellows.

Dominance of English Language in Scholarly Communication







Impact of Language Barrier for non -EU respondents



While a majority of non-EU MSCA researchers did not feel that language barriers significantly impacted their work or well-being, a notable portion—especially in terms of workflow—reported challenges, highlighting the need for continued support in overcoming language -related obstacles in the EU research environment
